A West Virginia man was seriously injured after his motorcycle collided with a semitrailer shortly after 7:30 p.m. Friday on

John Hudnall, 56, of Kanawha, W.V., was driving his 2007 Harley Davidson Sportster west on U.S. 33, east of Wapak Fisher Road in Pusheta Township at 7:37 p.m. when he went left of center due to a possible vehicle defect and was struck by a 2006 Freightliner semitrailer driven east by Eric Mallion, 47, of Lakeland, Fla.

Hudnall was transported to Lima Memorial Hospital with serious incapacitating injuries, said Sgt. Rick Albers with the Wapakoneta Post of the Ohio State Highway Patrol, which handled the collision.

He was wearing a helmet.

A condition report from the hospital was not available.

Albers said because it is believed Hudnall's tire went flat or was losing air which may have contributed to the crash. No citations have been issued.

His motorcycle sustained severe damage.

The semitrailer sustained functional damage. Alcohol was not sus-

pected as a factor.

A new Supreme Court decision intends to make criminals speak up in order to stay silent.

In a 5-4 split decision, the U.S. Supreme Court expanded its limits on Miranda rights for criminal suspects on Tuesday.

According to Justice Anthony Kennedy's majority opinion, a suspect who chooses to talk to police after being informed he doesn't have to has waived his right to remain silent.

A right to remain silent and a right to a lawyer are at the top of

the warnings that police recite to suspects during arrests and interrogations. Tuesday's Supreme Court ruling said that suspects must break their silence and tell police they are going to remain quiet to stop an interrogation, just as they must tell





for oil and shoring up miles of boom. County officials will use it to block oil from reaching inland waterways but plan to leave beaches unprotected because they are too difficult to protect and easier to clean up.

"It's inevitable that we

will see it on the beaches," said Keith Wilkins, deputy chief of neighborhood and community services for Escambia County.

The oil has been spreading in the Gulf since the Deepwater Horizon rig exploded six weeks ago, killing 11 workers and

eventually sinking. The rig was being operated for BP, the largest oil and gas producer in the Gulf.

Crude has already been reported along barrier islands in Alabama and Mississippi, and it has polluted some 125 miles of Louisiana coastline.

More federal fishing waters were closed, too, another setback for one of the region's most important industries. More than one-third of federal waters were off-limits for fishing, along with hundreds of square miles of state waters.


